Chairman's Report

Season's Greetings to all our readers. Whilst Christmas is essentially a Christian festival, our greetings go out to everyone in the village regardless of religion, faith or beliefs.

It is recognised as a period of sharing and celebration and you will see around the village our contribution to this with decorations, decorated trees and lights. We also feature at this time our Christmas Carol Concert which takes place on Thursday 12th December 2024 at 7.00pm in the Village Hall, to which all are welcome. Musical accompaniment is provided by the Shirland Brass Band. Admission is free so come along and get into the spirit!

The last few months have been busy from the Council's point of view, with discussions and foremost in this is preliminary planning to extend the Sports Pavilion into the upper floor. Whether we go ahead with this venture will be a matter for public opinion to decide on. It would provide activity space for indoor sports, exercise classes, perhaps workspace for those lacking the facilities for home working and so on. If it goes ahead,

it will be an investment for the future for the village. However, it comes at a price and the Council will need to justify this against usage and the need to cover our costs over 10 or so years. Look out for more on this in coming months but if you have a need for such space or a bright idea how it can be economically used, please contact the Parish Clerk, who will be pleased to hear from you with your ideas.

Those who participated will remember the consultation which took place earlier this year to identify what residents want from the Council over coming years. The results are still being analysed and will be reported in the next couple of months. These will influence the 3-year planning of the Parish Council and how they are paid for, given our limited funding. However, there is much that we have already identified we can do with little outlay, and we'll be looking at how these actions can be implemented. Chief amongst these is a central calendar of all the activities taking place in the village, as it is clear that messages about what's taking place don't always reach residents who miss out and the activities end up being under supported. This will involve bringing all organisations in

the village together to decide how this can be achieved. Again, look out for developments of this initiative.

Natalie Fleet MP writes

I want to start the first of my regular columns in the parish newsletter by saying thank you to everyone who voted for me to be your MP. What an honour it is to have been chosen to represent the Bolsover constituency in Parliament.

My first few months of being an MP have been a whirlwind - there is a lot to learn and a lot to do!

I have received thousands of emails from residents about all sorts of issues and concerns. After a stringent recruitment process, I now have a full team of staff members in place, and we are working through the backlog as quickly as possible. Thank you for your patience while we do so.

Since the election, I have wasted no time taking up some of the most important issues for our area. I have met with NHS bosses for Derbyshire to discuss the challenges our local NHS is facing, including access to GPs and dentists, including in Pilsley.

I also joined with other coalfield constituency MPs to lobby the Government to end the injustice of the Mineworkers' Pension Scheme. I am delighted that in the recent Budget, the Chancellor Rachel Reeves announced that the £1.5 billion in the Investment Reserve Fund will be transferred to MPS members and their families.

A total of 3,501 ex-miners in Bolsover constituency will benefit from this move, with pensions being boosted by 32 per cent, or an average increase of £29 per week. The even better news is that the first

payments have already gone into pension packets.

I have since been contacted by many former miners who are part of the BCSSS scheme, which was for employees in management roles in the coal industry. They are asking whether its investment reserve fund can also be transferred to members. Be assured that I am taking up this issue with ministers and pressing for this to happen as soon as possible.

I have spoken to Midlands Connect and National Highways about the congestion at junction 28 of the M1 and the A38 - and have been made Parliamentary Champion for junction 28. I have an appointment with the Roads Minister in the diary and will be making the case for getting much-needed improvements to alleviate some of the traffic problems.

Lastly, I had an extremely interesting meeting with headteachers from across the patch about the issues schools are currently facing. It was heartbreaking to hear about the effects that buildings in poor repair are having on our young people's education and how the county council's handling of special educational needs provision is failing so many pupils. I am following up a number of issues raised by the heads with ministers and will report back when I have the answers to their questions.

I look forward to meeting many more of you and tackling more of your priority issues in the coming months. Please do get in touch if you need my help at natalie.fleet.mp@parliament.uk.

County Councillor's Report



The state of Derbyshire's roads and pavements is one issue I can always be sure people will raise with me. So, I was pleased when work started on resurfacing the footpaths along Queen Street and Brunswick Street. Part of Lansbury Avenue is also due to be resurfaced and it's just been announced that the pavements on Rouse Street and Grange Road are on next year's list.

Sadly, the only road in the village to make next year's list is Hazel Close, which is disappointing given that I also put forward a number of other roads for inclusion. One of those was Green Lane and now that the new footpath between Barnetts Way and Rupert Street has been built I've gone back to Highway Officers to see about getting it added to next year's programme. Acacia Drive is another road that's in a poor state and so I've been pressing to get it repaired, too.

Problems caused by irresponsible parking outside both schools is a perennial issue. There is no easy solution, but I have spoken to the police and the council's parking enforcement department and both have said that they will carry out additional patrols outside both schools and issue tickets to anyone parking inappropriately.

Each year the County Council gives me a small pot of money to support local clubs and groups. I have already given grants to clubs and groups in the village, most recently to support the Thursday café at the St. Mary's Centre. But I still have some funding left and if you're involved in a group in the parish and want to apply do get in touch with me.

Derbyshire County Council's finances continue to deteriorate. Having overspent by £114m in the last two years the County Council's Cabinet said this year it would only have to use £10m of its reserves to balance the books. However, by July that figure was nearer £30m and we have now just been told the sum is looking more like £40m.

This continued overspending means that the cuts announced at the beginning of this year by the controlling group's Cabinet continue. Last month some really big ones were agreed, including the closing down or selling off of most of the council's residential care homes, one of which was only opened a few years ago. Day centres for older people, including the one in Clay Cross, are also being closed. Grants to a whole range of voluntary groups and charities that help local people are ending, too. These include grants to pensioner luncheon clubs and befriending services, as well as local organisations such as Age Concern, The Volunteer Centre (Chesterfield), Derbyshire Law Centre, and Links CVS in Chesterfield.

November saw Ofsted publish what can only be described as a truly damning report on Derbyshire County Council's

Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) provision. It concluded that there was widespread/systematic failings and that too many children and young people had been failed by the council for too long. That report was published only a few weeks after an equally damning report by the Local Government Ombudsman which detailed over 40 cases of maladministration by the county council in the way it handled complaints made by the families of SEND children, ordering the council to pay over £230,000 in compensation. Neither report will have come as a surprise to anyone who had any contact with this service and I know from raising cases on behalf of people how unresponsive the current council has been.

Finally, I'd like to thank everyone who gave me a few moments of their time if I managed to catch you at home when I called this year. Those doorstep conversations and really helpful to me in my role as your councillor.

With Christmas only days away I'd like to conclude by wishing you and your family a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

As Christmas is just around the corner I would like to give our patients a polite reminder to look at what medication you have and to order in time for the coming holidays, this is one of our main challenges as our aim is to get your medication ready before the Christmas holidays.

Services

Pharmacy First is new to this year and covers 7 conditions that no longer needs a GP appointment and over the busy winter season this can be extremely helpful for patient who have any of the following conditions.

These include:

- Urinary tract infection (women only)
- Sore Throat
- Sinusitis
- Earache (1-17years)
- Impetigo
- Shingles and infected insect bites

This service will help your GP surgery by creating more appointments for patients with more clinical needs. So if you have any on the conditions please call in to see us and we may be able to help.

Contraception service

This is for patients who wish to re-new their contraception medication they are taking and / or for patients that are new and wish to start the contraception.

We are now a Covid vaccination hub where patients who would like to have a covid vaccine can do so, either book online or call us on 01773 875550 and we can arrange a time slot for you. This service finishes on the 20th December 2024.

School reports

Park House Primary School

We have had a busy term so far, welcoming families to tour the school in readiness for September 2025 and our Year 6 families applying for their child's next academic adventure at secondary school. We will still be running tours until the end of term for our next Reception class intake, so any interested families are welcome to get in touch and see us in action.

It has been lovely to meet and welcome Reverend Lee to school and we look forward to continuing to work together. We are preparing for our annual Christmas Carol Concert at St Mary's Church and our Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 Nativity. The singing is amazing, and we are really looking forward to sharing these with our families.

We have had some bittersweet moments with Mrs Mosley taking the decision to move on to do new things. Mrs Mosley has worked at Park House for 24 years and was instrumental in setting up and running our breakfast and afterschool club provision. She is going to be missed by so many of us. We are very fortunate though to have Mrs Newton returning to work with us in time for the new year.

Sports Events

Year 1 have attended a gymnastics interschool event, and the pupils got to see an elite trampolinist training whilst they got to experience the different equipment at Graves Leisure Centre.

Sadly, the snow that arrived disrupted the Year 3/4 football team from taking part in our cluster of school's tournament. We are looking forward to the rescheduled event in the new year and are sure they will follow in the successful footsteps of our Year 6 team who have qualified for the district finals by winning every match in their latest tournament.

Not only do we take part in a variety of interschool events, we also offer a range of sports clubs afterschool. In the last term we have run football, kwik cricket, gymnastics, Zumba dance and fencing.

Curriculum

We have been holding Design and Technology days across school this term. It was lovely to see and hear the discussions on how to make the designs work and how they could be improved. Year 2 were testing how to make strong chairs, Year 4 investigated how to make 3d shapes using marshmallows and dowels, Year 5 learned how to make spaghetti bolognese, and Year 6 made 3d playgrounds with moving parts such as swings and roundabouts. The concentration and collaboration between pupils was so lovely to see and fun was had by all.

We do find that experiences help to enhance our learning from trips to in school events. Year 4 have been Vikings for a day, dressing up and exploring Viking food, crafts and making Viking armour.

SMILERS

You may have noticed the banner outside school about us becoming a SMILERS school. We had a surprise visit from Walter the Owl who helped launch the SMILERS project.

As part of the SMILERS project, we are working with Derbyshire County Council on an approach that has been developed to support the wellbeing of the whole school community. It is based on the NHS 5 Ways to Wellbeing which is an evidence-based approach. The purpose of the project is to empower the whole school community to become architects of their own wellbeing within an enabling environment.

SMILERS is an acronym to help us remember the things we can do to improve our own mental health. This is for grown-ups, as well as for children. We have Team SMILER ambassadors who have introduced the first two letters for stay connected and move.



Each half term we will introduce the next section.

S = Stay connected (healthy relationships)

M = Move

I = Interests

L = Look

E = Eat well

R = Rest

We have also raised £175 for Children in Need by coming to school with 'Mad Hair'. The designs are always so creative, and this year included a giant sunflower, pot noodles, a washing line, cupcakes, spiders and quite a range of colour and sparkles. Our pupils looked amazing!

This year, Rob Turner, Richard Ashmore, Kev Jones and Steve Nottingham were all added to the Lifetime Members Board.

Winter Walk

Back by popular demand we have a slightly longer walk around the village than in our summer edition.

This walk is 6.5 kilometres and should take roughly 1 hour and 50 minutes to complete.

As the nights and cold weather draw in it may be best to try this during day light and during slightly warmer periods.

Our winter walk starts on Bridge Street, heads up and along Morton Road and then down to recreational ground.

Next the walk heads down through the fields, past Hallgate Lane until you reach Pilsley Road opposite the Parkhouse recreational ground.

From here turn right follow the road, heading straight on up Locko Lane at the crossroad.

Once past Mulberry Walk take the footpath on your right up to Green Lane and follow it on until you join the five pits trail.

Continue on the five pits trail until you reach Station Road and then head right, following until you reach Bridge Street.
