Freeman of the Parish

The Parish Council is limited as to how it can thank people who have gone out of their way to improve the quality of life of our community. However, we do have the power to bestow one honour – that of the title of Freeman of the Parish. This is a recognised honour which has been seldom used in Pilsley. In fact we have been unable to find any record within recorded memory where it has been bestowed. However, I am pleased to tell you that at its meeting on 3rd June 2024, the Council resolved to bestow this honour on Don Foster. Everyone knows Don from his efforts to help keep the streets of the village tidy by voluntarily taking out his litter picker and bag several times a week, turning out in most weathers. This assists the Parish operatives in making sure litter doesn't rest long on our footpaths, verges and roads. He's been doing it for more than 30 years and is a well-known figure in the community. What is less well known about Don is that he has also been very active in raising money for a number of charities throughout this time. You'll see more of why we felt it appropriate to present this award

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in this newsletter and elsewhere in coming weeks. There is to be a formal presentation of the title in August, so look out for updates – it will be open to the public to come along and offer their own thanks.

Consultation - What do you want us to do?

The Parish Council has held a number of consultation events since the beginning of the year in an effort to find out what your priorities are in relation to what we, as a public body, can provide.

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Basically, the question is – where do you want us to spend the limited funds we have available for the benefit of residents? Whilst the formal events are now completed and have been quite productive, you can still have your say. Simply go to the Parish Council website and look for the Consultation page or contact one of the Parish Councillors with your ideas. The more people we hear from the better will determine the nature of what can be offered. You never know, you may have the bright idea which will make a huge difference to the quality of life for all the community!

The results of the consultation will be published during the summer and will influence how we invest for future generations.

Hardwick 10k Road Race

Just a quick reminder that the annual Hardwick 10k Road Race takes place on 18th July 2024. The start is at 7.30pm from outside Pilsley Primary School on Station Road. It does mean that Staton Road and Hardstoft Road (and all roads leading from them) will be closed (following application to the local authorities and Police) whilst there are runners on the route from 7.00pm through till about 9.30pm. The Organisers apologise

for any inconvenience this causes. Diversions to direct traffic through the village in safety will be in place. It is just a couple of hours once a year and the event itself does bring a lot of prestige to the village. We want all residents, spectators and most of all the runners to continue to enjoy the event, which has been the case over the last 30+ years the race has been held.

On this note, the Organisers are still seeking voluntary marshals from the village. Modest rewards are on offer to volunteers!!

Don't forget your voter ID!

With a General Election on July 4th looming here is a reminder of the new rules regarding voter ID.

In order to vote in elections new rules were introduced which you may have come across if you voted in the local elections in May.

You now need to present a valid form of photo ID in order to cast your vote.

The photo ID you show must be the original version. You cannot use a photograph, image on a phone or a photocopy of your ID.

You'll need one of the following types of photo ID to vote:

- A UK or Northern Ireland photocard driving licence (full or provisional).
- A driving licence issued by an EU country, Norway, Iceland, Liechtenstein, the Isle of Man or any of the Channel Islands.
- A UK passport.
- A passport issued by an EU country, Norway,

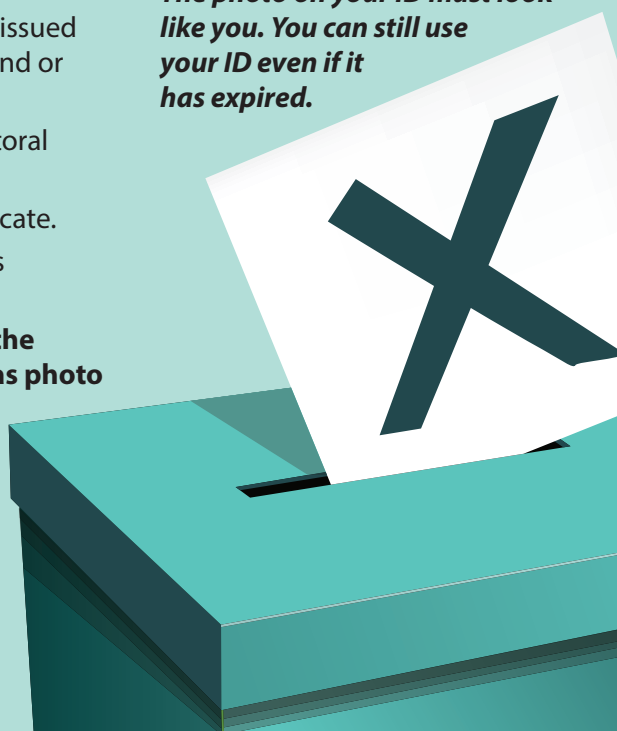
- Iceland, Liechtenstein or a Commonwealth country.
- A PASS card (National Proof of Age Standards Scheme).
- A Blue Badge.
- A biometric residence permit (BRP).
- A Defence Identity Card (MOD form 90).
- A national identity card issued by the EU, Norway, Iceland or Liechtenstein.
- A Northern Ireland Electoral Identity Card.
- A Voter Authority Certificate.
- An Anonymous Elector's Document.

You can also use one of the following travel passes as photo ID when you vote:

- An older person's bus pass.
- A disabled person's bus pass.
- An Oyster 60+ card.
- A Freedom Pass.

- A Scottish National Entitlement Card (NEC).
- A 60 and Over Welsh Concessionary Travel Card.
- A Disabled Person's Welsh Concessionary Travel Card.
- A Northern Ireland concessionary travel pass.

The photo on your ID must look like you. You can still use your ID even if it has expired.



County Councillor's Report

In my last article I reported on the parlous state of Derbyshire County Council's finances following last September's revelation that the council was in danger of running out of money because of the way I had been run.

What wasn't fully known at that time was what this sudden need to save £40m over the next 12 months would mean for council services and the people who use them. However, over the last few months things have become clearer and some people in Pilsley and Lower Pilsley are already feeling the consequences.

From this July, the council's new charging policy increases the amount pensioners and other vulnerable adults have to pay for their Home Help Service. That's the service that helps people remain safely in their own home and avoid having to go into a care home or stay longer in hospital than is necessary. I've already heard of people whose bill has gone up to over £1,000 a month and I've seen how worrying this is to them.

The council has also now announced plans to close up to 12 of its residential care homes for older people and ceasing to directly operate all of its day care centre provision, including the one based in Clay Cross. The Council's Cabinet has also agreed to close 10 of the 22 Children's Centres that support vulnerable children and their families. The nearest one, Alice's View in North Wingfield, remains open but

the number of staff is being cut again, this time by more than half, to around 100 staff for the whole of the county. If you want to know more about these or any of the other reductions in council services you can find full details on the County Council's website.

The state of the local roads is a recurring problem and I know that Station Road is in a particularly poor condition. I recently asked for it to be reinspected and although it's acknowledged to be in a bad condition, Highways have told me that there over 300 other roads in as bad or worse condition and so the prospect of getting it resurfaced in the near future looks slim given the current funding.

The village is blessed to be surrounded by some beautiful countryside and many people use the public rights of way to take advantage of it. Each year residents contact me when these paths become overgrown and need the vegetation cutting back. In previous years the County Council's Countryside Service has generally been quick to respond when I refer the problem to them but this year things are taking much longer which I know is a cause of frustration for some people. However, I would still encourage you to use the County

Council's website reporting facility to report any path this is overgrown.

At the beginning of May elections took place for the new East Midlands Mayor which saw Claire Ward elected to fill the role. I've previously written about my concerns about the creation of this post but the majority group that runs the County Council went ahead and supported the proposal. Now that we have a Mayor my view is that we have to make it work and ensure that Derbyshire gets its fair share of any funding. It was, therefore, disappointing to learn that because the current Leader of the County Council wasn't elected as the Chair of one of the new Boards that have been created he has decided to withdraw the Council's funding for the body because he no longer sees any "advantage" for the council. How this impacts on the work of the new Authority is unclear but it certainly doesn't help Derbyshire position when decisions are taken.

May's elections and then the general election stopped my annual door knock of the village but now that they are out of the way I intend to restart. However, you don't have to wait for me to knock on your door if you want to talk to me, you'll find my contact details in this magazine and don't be afraid to get in touch.

A message from the East Midlands Mayor

If we can achieve that in

just over a month, I'm excited about what we can deliver over the next four years.

Together, Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire are great places to live and work, but we could be better. Better connected, better funded, and better prepared for a future of opportunity and growth. I'm committed to delivering thousands of new jobs and enhancing skills for our future generations. Our young people shouldn't have to move away to find opportunities. Housing is another crucial area where I plan to make a difference. I'll focus on building affordable homes to

ensure everyone has a place to call their own and tackle homelessness with compassionate, effective solutions.

I want to be straight with you from the start. I can't just wave a magic wand and erase the fact that the East Midlands has been so poorly invested in over the years, but by working together with the government and our local councils, we can build a better future for our children, support our businesses to innovate and grow, and ensure everyone has the chance to live a fulfilling life. As mayor, I will be dedicated to making this a reality.

Hay fever medications

Summer is finally here, although it may not feel like it just yet. Hay fever is a common allergy and is usually worse between late March and September, especially when it's warm, humid and windy. This is when the pollen count is at its highest.

We are unable to issue prescriptions for hay fever medication as this can safely and effectively be purchased over the counter from pharmacies or even supermarkets.

Your local pharmacy can advise you on suitable medications to take.

Symptoms of hay fever include:

- Sneezing and coughing
- A runny or blocked nose itchy, red, or watery eyes
- Itchy throat, mouth, nose, and ears
- Loss of smell
- Pain around your temples and forehead headache
- Earache
- Feeling tired

Well Pharmacy

Hello, as many of you may have seen in the media there has been a big change in the world of community pharmacy and I would like to take this opportunity to explain a bit more about this brand new service.

Pharmacy First

The Pharmacy First service has been introduced earlier in the year and covers seven conditions that you no longer need to have a GP appointment for.

These include:

- Urinary tract infection (women only)
- Sore throat
- Sinusitis
- Earache (1-17 years)
- Impetigo
- Shingles and Infected insect bites.

These conditions can now be seen by a Pharmacist and no appointment is necessary which can save you a trip to your GP surgery.

Contraception Service

Well Pharmacy are now providing the new contraception service where patients can come to the Pharmacy and be prescribed contraception medication without the need for a GP appointment.

This is for patients who wish to just re-new their contraception medication they are taking and/or patients that are new and wish to start the contraception.



FLU Vaccinations

The FLU season is just around the corner and from the end of June we will be taking in bookings as normal for the 24/25 season, this starts in September and the demand for the vaccine has increased significantly over the past few years which is why we start with the bookings early to fulfil the orders. If you would like to book just call the Pharmacy and we can arrange a time and date to suit you.

Other services provided by the Pharmacy include blood pressure checks, Pneumonia/covid vaccines.

Parking around the village

In recent months the Parish council have noted an increase in cars parked on pavements and grass verges.

While not illegal, we would like to remind drivers that pavements are for the use of pedestrians and the grass verges are often used by local dogs. Cars parked

We appreciate that there is limited parking in the village, particularly around school opening and closing times, so we ask that where possible could drivers please park on the road or in the carpark.

School reports

Park House Primary School

It has been another great year for Park House Primary School. So much learning, events and achievements have happened.

It is the time of year we are preparing to say farewell and wish our Year 6 class all the best as they transition to secondary school but also start to welcome our new Reception class in September. We are so proud of Year 6 and how they have approached the statutory end of key stage assessments (SATs). We don't have the results yet, but we know how hard they have worked and that they will continue to go on and do well. Amongst their transition sessions, they are preparing for our end of year performance with Year 5, with a production of Alice in Wonderland.

This year we have had many sporting achievements with our Year 3/4 football team coming third overall in our interschool cluster finals. At the time of writing this update, our netball team are through to the interschool cluster finals and so are our Year 5/6 football team. Our classes have enjoyed a variety of interschool sporting events from tag rugby, gymnastics, netball to invasion games. We still have a few more events to attend this term, with Year 2 and Year 6 attending the EIS in Sheffield for an Olympic style sports day. All our classes have been learning tennis this term and we are proud to have a pupil representing at a county level.

Pilsley Primary School

All the children have worked so hard this year but it has been a particularly challenging time for our Year 6's as they tackled their SATs tests. We are so proud of how they settled to the papers and showed us all they had learned in their time with us. They will now be getting ready for transition to secondary school, their school production and of course the residential.

Our other pupils have various trips, Sport's Day and the end of term treat to look forward to.

We have finally seen work completed on the Sensory Pod for our most vulnerable children and they have been enjoying the specialised equipment, especially the water bed! Work is continuing on our new classroom and library which should be completed at the beginning of August ready for the new academic year. The team are enjoying choosing authors and books with the children to help fill the new library.

We also have building work in progress inside school too, with 2 new intervention rooms and a new pastoral room being created from space within school. We are hoping these will be up and running in the next fortnight.

We would like to give a big thanks to the community for their support this year (including filling out Tesco blue tokens pot!) and we hope you all have a lovely Summer break when it comes.

We still have some forthcoming trips, Reception who are exploring transport and how this has changed over the years, will be visiting Crich Tramway Museum, Year 3 have a river studies visit and Year 4 will be exploring about pollution and the impact upon our oceans at the Deep in Hull.

We have also had a number of visitors to school this year from the Parish Council, where we have been able to discuss different things affecting school and the local community. One aspect discussed has been the issues regarding parking around school at pick up and drop off times. We remind our families about considerate and safe parking regularly. Sadly, the

traffic regulations order outside school hasn't resolved the parking issues and we have spoken with Derbyshire County Council to see if they can try to help the situation. We are grateful to the Parish Council who kindly contribute to us providing a school crossing patrol to help keep our families safe.

We are looking forward to and preparations are under way for our summer fair, which will be held on Saturday 13th July, all are welcome to join us.

Pilsley and Clay Cross Cricket Club
