Chairman's Report

We're into the build up to Christmas and everyone at the Council wishes all our residents heartfelt season's greetings let's hope we can all enjoy the festivities!

On this note the Parish Council is contributing in an effort to lift spirits. This year, observant residents will have noticed that some of the lampposts have been adorned with decorations, which will be illuminated to coincide with the installation of Christmas trees on Church Street and Parkhouse Road recreation grounds. Just to explain, much as we would like, we can't put the illuminated decorations on all lamp standards – we can only use the metal ones. For reasons of construction, concrete posts cannot be used. Unfortunately, we have many concrete posts in the village, particularly on Station Road and Hardstoft Road. We're not being meanies and our plan in coming years is to make sure most metal posts on the main roads will have decorations installed and look at what we can do to brighten up those main roads through the village which can't be decorated in that way.



Traditionally, the Parish Council have hosted a Carol Concert in the Village Hall. This is open to all and this year will take place on Thursday, 21st December 2023 from 7.00pm. The music will be provided by Shirland Brass Band and refreshments will be provided by Pilsley Women's Institute. We are grateful for their help!

Now, just a couple of updates starting with speed reduction measures in the village, an issue which concerns many residents. Following re-calibration, the speed indicator devices on Parkhouse Road and Morton Road are fully operational and will be joined in the New Year by a third on Station Road. Also, the Village Speedwatch Team - all volunteers - have completed their training and certification and are now active at the roadside. They

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will be monitoring the behaviour of motorists passing through the village and reporting issues to the Police where necessary, in an effort to improve road safety. There have also been sightings of the Police mobile cameras operating in the village to support this. Please take note! We are, incidentally, aware of issues to do with the quality of the resurfacing of Hardstoft Road which took place in October and are working with the County Council to secure the return of the Contractors to remedy the faults which are very obvious.

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A long-term plan of the Parish Council has been to find space for and to develop a Pump Track for cyclists somewhere in the village. This is still work in progress and we are currently evaluating proposals. These will form part of a Consultation exercise we have scheduled for the coming months. The consultation will be wide ranging to try to identify how the Parish Council can provide facilities and services in the village within our budgets but in a way that benefits residents. It will be the basis of a 3-year plan to take us up to the next election in 2027. Keep an eye out for the

consultation invitation – it will be published over the coming weeks and please let us have your views. The more people who respond the better picture we get of what's required to make Pilsley a better place!

I hope you are all able to have a very merry Christmas and a Happy New Year!

County Councillor's Report

Last September Derbyshire County Council announced that it needed to make £46m in saving before next April if it was to balance its books. It is one of the most important announcements that a council can make yet it came out of the blue. Indeed, on the very same day the Leader of the Council had told councillors that he had nothing important to tell them.

Whilst that announcement does not mean the council is about to go bankrupt, it does mean that if the savings are not made the council will have used up its reserves. It also means that unless the government substantially increases the grant it gives to the council in the next financial year your council tax will have to go up significantly, and even more cuts to services will have to happen if it is to avoid running out of money.

The Council Leader has said that he believes that the £46m can be saved by freezing recruitment, reducing overtime and postponing doing things. What that means locally is still unclear, but it does, for example, mean that the council is unlikely to replace the school crossing patrol at Pilsley School for some time. I have also been told by the Countryside Service that they may not be able to respond to all of the complaints I pass onto them.

I have supported a call for a special

council meeting where councillors can be told what all of this means for their communities, but we were told that we could not have that meeting for 7 weeks.

One issue that is progressing is the government's proposals to create a Mayor for Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire. The legislation to allow this to happen was enacted in November and the council will have to vote on the proposal in December. I have always been sceptical of the benefit Derbyshire will get from the extra £38m of spending a Mayor will bring, especially given how much the office of a Mayor will cost. It has also been made clear that the Mayor can take over responsibility for police and fire services and even merge the Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire services, something that I fear would be detrimental to the residents of our county. This means, however, that next May as well as electing a Police & Crime Commissioner you will also elect a Mayor.

On a more positive note, the Council recently published its highways capital programme for 2024-25 and I am pleased to say that the pavements of Queen Street and parts of Lansbury Avenue are included on the list for resurfacing at a cost of over £130,000. However, whilst the total highway repair budget for the year stands at just under £24m the backlog of work that needs doing across the county is estimated to be in excess of £1 billion which helps explain why there are so many problems with the roads and footpaths.

In October I brought the
Managing Director of the County
Council to Pilsley to show
her some of the issues I keep
raising on behalf of residents.
In particular, I stressed how
important it was to many residents
that action was taken to improve
the bus service but, sadly, she was
unable to commit to do anything
about it.

I think it is incredibly important for MPs to keep in touch with their constituents. Every week I try visit a village in the constituency and knock on doors, so that residents have an opportunity to let me know their thoughts on national issues or raise any local concerns. Whether that's road safety, potholes, or access to GPs.

In November, it was the turn of Pilsley, where I talked to about 30 residents on Peak Close, Reeves Avenue, and Willow Close.

A number of issues were raised such as the maintenance of the five-pits trail, the £24 million funding for the new emergency care centre at Chesterfield Royal, potholes, and access to NHS dentistry.

I also took up some casework regarding benefits and utility issues which my office is now dealing with.

The Bolsover Constituency is very

geographically dispersed. It runs from Barlborough & M1 Junction 30 in the North to Pinxton and Junction 28 in the South. And from Shirebrook and Langwith in the East to villages like Calow and Woolley Moor in the West. It covers four towns and 56 villages, it is incredibly difficult to cover every street, but I do try my best! And please rest assured if you haven't seen me at my recent session - hopefully I will see you on the doorstep soon, but if not please do not hesitate to contact me if you want to raise an issue or need some assistance – I am here

to help.

After speaking with residents, I had the opportunity to spend some time at the Pilsley War Memorial ahead of Remembrance Sunday, lay a cross, and pay my respects to those who gave the ultimate sacrifice for our country.

Armistice Day and the events around Remembrance are an incredibly emotional and moving time of year.

I've always considered my role representing constituents at these events a tremendous honour and the most humbling experience in my role as the Member of Parliament for Bolsover.

Finally, I am due meet with Pilsley Parish Council at the start of December and I look forward to updating you all in the next newsletter ...

Pilsley Community Football Club

Over recent years the club has been successful in securing tens of thousands of pounds of external grants to improve facilities at Pilsley Sports Ground, however, since forming almost 10 years ago our main aim has always been the creation of a brand new football pitch within the village. This would ensure we can provide great facilities for our growing number of teams for generations to come.

After almost 6 years years of hard work, and with the support of many local, regional and national organisations we have today taken ownership of a long term lease on land next to the existing pitch on the sports ground that will be converted to a FA approved, full sized football pitch.

All of the funding for this major investment is in place due to the massive support from the Football Foundation, Forge New Homes, Derbyshire County FA and North East Derbyshire District Council.

Work will start in the coming

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weeks to convert the land into what will be one of the best pitches in the area and the club would like to thank J Pugh-Lewis Ltd for their help throughout the process.

The club would also like to Pilsley Parish Council, Pilsley Village Sports Association and Pilsley & Clay Cross CC for their ongoing support.

This is a major development for the club and with the delivery of this new pitch, along with the 10 year anniversary coming up in 2024, the club has an incredibly exciting future!

In recent months, Pilsley Parish **Council have noticed an uptick** in the amount of dog poo around our public spaces. As the dark nights draw in, we expect this issue to increase.

Dog fouling poses significant health risks, particularly to children, the details of which can be found on the Derbyshire County Council website.

North East Derbyshire District Council recognises it as a criminal offence under a Public Spaces Protection Order not to clean up your dog's waste. This is enforceable through £100 fixed penalty notices, and it is not an excuse to say you

did not witness your dog foul.

If you do not have the means to pick up, you may also receive a £100 fixed penalty notice.

If you witness a dog fouling offence occur, these can be reported via the North East Derbyshire District Council website.

Free dog bags are available and dog waste bins are located at the following locations throughout the village.

Anyone wishing to join the sessions are welcome to come along and if you'd like any more information beforehand, please contact John Worthy on 07713 193912.




were also presented to Jack Warsop and Jason Clayton, Captains Player of the Year to Gareth Hatton and Steve Wood
